TREASURER'S REPORT



October was a busy month for the club's treasury!

The first weekend we had the Treasures of the Earth (TOTE) Show, which raised \$1,547.47 that is about average for October shows. Show sales included \$870 for 87 Adult grab bags, \$182 for 26 Fossil grab bags, \$100 for 50 Kid's grab bags, \$248 for the Labradorite raffle, \$93.47 in donations, and \$54 for 5 adult Memberships. Please welcome the following new members from the show: Bryan & Kelly Harrison, Ed Jarawich, and Tony Zydlewski.

Two weeks later at the club meeting, we raised \$69 from 4 new members, \$53 from late auction sales, \$52 from the paid raffle and \$21 from specimen sales. Club expenses were routine, except \$10.60 for raffle tickets and for \$29.95 for the show volunteer raffle, which was won by Roger Blackman who kindly passed the prize to Kelley Finch! Please welcome the following new members to the club: Jasmine Galan, and George & Stacy & Ella Johnson. That brings total club membership to 162 adults and 21 children.



FOSSIL HUNT REPORT

Thank you to all that came out for the October 24-26 Collecting Days. This was the first time that we did a weekday collecting and I think it went very well, even though it was a rushed date.

We had 21 people come out from Tuesday to Thursday and many great specimens were found.

Tom Leary found a nice whale backbone, Mike Griffiths a nice Ecphora, Rick Jacquot collected lots of Chesapectens and also found two whale ear bones while walking the shoreline where others had walked past at a rush. Rick was walking slow and spotted the ear bones in two different areas. Many double Chesapecten jeffersonius were found this time, many in very good condition.

I even got a lot of time to collect and the pictures are some of what I found. Tuesday, Rick and myself were working a rubble area and we both found some Ecphora fragments attached to other material. Then I turned a cluster over and the small Ecphora appeared. A little later I was looking beneath some tree branches and found the Calcite crystals. This is probably the most exciting thing I have found since the whale jaw in 2015.

Thursday morning a few of us were back on the beach and about 35 feet from the shoreline entrance, I found the larger Ecphora next to the bluff. I do not know if it rolled out on Wednesday night or was completely missed by everyone on Wednesday. The last picture is the cleaned specimen. I only used water to clean the crystals and the Ecphora.

Someone left their walking stick at the beach. It is an Ozark Trails stick. Please let me know if you left it behind. (rockdoctor48@wmconnect.com)

Brad's Bench Tips by Brad Smith

I'd like to apologize to those of you who read my Jewelry Bench Tips in your clubs' newsletters each month. The wife and I are getting older and decided it was time to move closer to the family, so our lives over the summer were a turmoil of packing and shipping about 11,000 pounds across country to the shores of Chesapeake Bay.



RAISING A CABOCHON

When a cabochon sits too low in a bezel, the bezel hides a lot of the stone. The solution is to either sand down the bezel height or boost up the stone. But if you choose to raise it up, the question is what is the best material to use?

I was taught to use fine sawdust but now think that might be a problem when used in rings. I reason that rings will frequently get wet, which would cause the sawdust to swell in size and push the stone against the bezel. Then when the sawdust dries out, the stone would be a little loose.


In any case, I now prefer to insert a flat sheet to boost up my stones. It can be a scrap of metal or some plastic from product packaging or old credit cards. In either case, just cut a piece to loosely fit into the bezel and drop in the stone (with some dental floss) to check its height.

AN UPDATE FROM BILL STINE REGARDING THE RECENT PIPSICO FOSSIL HUNT:

Rick Jacquot found this specimen at the recent Pipsico dig. I am sharing this as it is the best earbone specimen that I have ever seen found at camp.

Rick Jacquot wrote:

Finished cleaning my whale ear from Pipsico. This is one of the most complete ear bones I have found. Most are river worn and I never find them this good diving the Cooper and other rivers. This one was cemented in a sand matrix (picture on left). I soaked it for the past few days in 5% vinegar to loosen and remove the surrounding hardened sand. It came out nice, (middle and right pics). Most ear bones are worn from rolling along the river bottom like the one pictured on the far right. You hardly ever find them with the thin flange curving around the inside still intact.




