Hope to see everyone at the meeting.






TREASURER'S REPORT

OLD MINERAL CLEANING TIPS FROM THE 60'S

I found these in an old "How to Clean Minerals" booklet published by West Essex Mineral Club dated 1968. I have checked and all the products listed are still available.

Crystals (Non-water Soluble)

Use a solution of "Dip-it," a coffee pot cleaner. Cover the mineral with the solution, then heat it and allow to cool. Scrub the crystals and rinse in clear water.

"Polydent," a dental cleaner, can also be used. Add one teaspoon of the Polydent to each cup of water.

To clean fragile crystals, or those hard to reach recesses in some mineral specimens, use "Crew," a product of Johnson Wax Company. Just spray it on so the foam covers all the area. Let it set for a few minutes and then rinse with water. Works on fluorite and calcite and other non-water soluble crystals.

A detergent bath does not always remove all saw oil. Use "Fuller's Earth," place a slab or specimen in it—it absorbs all oil.

ACID TO CLEAN QUARTZ

"Oxalic acid" mix with warm water, then immerse the specimen and allow to stand overnight, then rinse in clear

water after removing the solution.

"Tartaric acid: in crystal form, mix in warm water then immerse in solution overnight.

Then rinse in clear water after removing from solution. Tartaric is stronger than Oxalic acid but milder than Hydrocholoric acid.

Crystals (Non-water Soluble)

Use a solution of "Dip-it," a coffee pot cleaner. Cover the mineral with the solution, then heat it and allow to cool. Scrub the crystals and rinse in clear water.

REMEMBER – No chemical injury is due to "accident" or "bad luck," it is caused by carelessness!!!

WHAT IS A GEM?

There is a difference between a "gem" and a "gemstone". A gem is the final cut and polished object. A gemstone is usually a mineral, but sometimes another natural material, in its untouched natural form.



For a mineral to be considered a gemstone, it has to have three basic properties. First, it has to be colorful and beautiful to look at. Second, it has to be hard enough to be able to be shaped, cut or polished. Its hardness is also important because gems are worn in jewelry, so a gemstone has to be hard enough to be worn in jewelry without being easily scratched, chipped or damaged.

Pipsico Fossil Finds August 12, 2023

We knew it was going to be a hot day. Bill Stine sent us a weather advisory about it beforehand and recommended bringing extra water. Once we got down to the beach we saw some serious changes that had been made. To stave off erosion, the Boy Scouts and the Department of Transportation built a Living Shoreline. This impacted finding shells like we usually did as we would make our way down to the cypress grove (if you weren't side-tracked and never made it down to the grove). They hauled in large rocks to make a jetty-like protection that paralled the shore and a variety of plants and grasses were planted to extend the beach to the rocks. In creating this they made a cove between the jetty-like breaks. There were about three along the shoreline.



The whale tooth fragments were found by Tom Leary and given to Julie Paine. Diane Soccio, and Steve Jones are regulars and their Ecphora and Chesapecten specimens were very good finds. The Chesapecten was found in a wash with both valves. A lot of people missed that one. Congratulations to Olga Suarez for finding the Megladon. That is the first I have seen found at a club dig in a number of years. She thought her husband dropped it for her to find. That reminds me of Lance and his dad leading mom and dropping shark teeth for her to find a number of years back!!! Juan said he did not drop it for her to find.


